Information for Taught Museum Session: Native Americans of the Northern Plains

Guided Trail

Investigate what objects tell us about the land where the nations of the Northern Plains lived and how their lifestyle adapted to their environment of grasslands and bison herds. See how they made and used clothes, tipis and dream catchers.

- Please allow for extra time if you want to visit the shop, or explore the Museum further

Learning Outcomes

Aims

- Understand how nations of the Northern Plains used to live, hunting bison and living in tipis
- Find out about the present life of the Plains people including how and why traditions are continued
- Understand what objects can tell us about people and their environment
- Appreciate how identity is expressed through use of pattern, animals and colour


Key Concepts

Pre-visit activities

- Find out where and how nations of the Northern Plains used to live, for example, the Blackfoot, Crow and Sioux. To discover more about Blackfoot culture, look at: http://www.glenbow.org/blackfoot/#
- Look on a map to see where the Northern Plains are in the USA and Canada. Search for pictures of the environment of the Northern Plains.

Post-visit activities

- Ask pupils to design an animal pattern representing their own family or school identity.
- Ask pupils to bring in objects which form an important part of their family or school identity.
