

Information for Taught Museum Session:

The Maya Hands-on Workshop, including Guided Trail

Use objects to build up a picture of what life was like for the Maya people living in the Classic period AD300-900.

Length of session: 75 minutes

Session Outline

- Welcome to the Museum (10 minutes)
- Fun handling activity where pupils work out the identity of mystery Maya objects (30 mins)
- Interactive guided tour of Maya objects around the Museum (20 mins)
- Designing a Maya headdress (15 minutes)
- Please organise groups to have a ratio of one Education Guide to every ten pupils

Learning Outcomes

Aims

- Build up a picture of what life was like in Classic Maya AD300-900 and consider what traditions continue for the Modern Maya
- Consider what is important to the Maya people

Key concepts

- Clothes and appearance
- Calendars and Gods
- Food and farming
- Leisure
- Weaving
- Materials and trade
- Modern Maya

Pre-visit activities

- Find out where the Classic Maya lived and where the Modern Maya now live.
- Find out about the ball game Pok-A-Tok.

Post-visit activities

- Make hot chocolate the Maya way!
- Make a headdress based on the design you created in the Museum.
- Design a huipil (shirt) with patterns distinct for your community, just as the Maya have specific designs for villages
