

Information for Taught Museum Session:

Stone Age to Iron Age Hands-on Workshop

Examine replica weapons, tools, containers and clothing to work out what period they represent. Develop pupils' questioning skills and understanding of this time.

Session Outline

- Welcome to the Museum (5 minutes)
- Matching replica objects to key periods: Paleolithic/ Mesolithic; Neolithic; Bronze Age; Iron Age (45 minutes)
- Self-guided trail exploring relevant Museum objects (20 minutes)
- Plenary (5 minutes)
- Please allow for extra time if you want to visit the shop or explore the Museum further

Learning Outcomes

Aims

- To explore changing technology through the Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages
- To examine the shift from a hunter-gatherer society to farming
- To find out about the everyday challenges of life for people from these times
- To assess different types of evidence for this period

Key concepts

- Shift from hunter-gatherers to farmers
- Technology
- Food
- Materials

Pre-visit activities

- Find out what materials they had available in the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age.
- Search for evidence of key monuments or buildings from the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age.

Post-visit activities

- Look at patterns on pots and jewellery from the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age. Recreate pots and jewellery using these designs.
- Try flint knapping using a bar of soap and a blunt knife!
- Think about what materials and objects might be left behind from our present day culture in 3,000 years time.
